





We welcome to this service all students and their families. May God's richest blessings be with all who graduate as they enter this new time in their lives. Today, we welcome as our speaker **Bishop Thomas J. Bickerton**.

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m ishop\ Thomas\ J.\ Bickerton}$ is Area Resident Bishop of the New Hope Episcopal Area. New Hope comprises New England and New York annual conferences.

Bishop Bickerton was appointed as the spiritual leader of the 409 United Methodist congregations in the New York Annual Conference in the fall of 2016 and the 537 congregations in the New England Annual Conference in the fall of 2024.

Bishop Bickerton was elected to the episcopacy in 2004 and served the Western Pennsylvania Annual Conference from 2004 to 2016 before being assigned to the New York Annual Conference in 2016 and the New England Annual Conference in 2024.

A native of West Virginia, Bishop Bickerton began his pastoral career as a student pastor serving a six-point charge. He later was pastor of medium- and large-membership churches, as well as serving as a District Superintendent. In those settings he developed valuable experience in rural, suburban, and urban ministry settings. As he worked in partnership with laity, the churches he served experienced significant growth in the number of baptisms, professions of faith, and members, as well as involvement in mission and outreach opportunities beyond the local church.

Bishop Bickerton's life has been significantly shaped by involvement in ministry. His work with Volunteer-in-Mission teams in his home state, as well as in Africa, Argentina, Israel, Mexico, Russia, Cuba, Puerto Rico, and the US Gulf Coast region, has given the Bishop a "true global perspective on the need to be in ministry to all of God's children."

Bishop Bickerton earned a Bachelor of Arts in sociology and psychology from West Virginia Wesleyan College, a Master of Divinity from Duke University Divinity School, and a Doctor of Ministry from United Theological Seminary.

Bishop Bickerton has also served the ministry of the wider church over the years as the President of the Council of Bishops, on the General Board of Global Ministries, President of the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), the University Senate, the General Commission on United Methodist Communications, the General Commission on United Methodist Men, the General Commission on Archives and History, and the General Commission on the Status and Role of Women.

Most notably, Bishop Bickerton served for 12 years as chair of the United Methodist Church's Global Health Initiative, which dealt with the church's response to the often fatal diseases of HIV/AIDS, tuberculosis, and malaria. This effort, through the church's Imagine NO Malaria campaign, raised over \$75 million within the denomination to eliminate malaria-related deaths across the world.
