The United States Agency for International Development (USAID) is the lead U.S. Government agency working in international development.






Our History

USAID was founded over 50 years ago in 1961 by President Kennedy to help advance progress in developing countries.



"There is no escaping our obligations: our moral obligations as a wise leader and good neighbor in the interdependent community of free nations — our economic obligations as the wealthiest people in a world of largely poor people, as a nation no longer dependent upon the loans from abroad that once helped us develop our own economy — and our political obligations as the single largest counter to the adversaries of freedom." — John F. Kennedy



2015--The Quadrennial Diplomacy and Development Review (QDDR) elevates development as an equal pillar of American foreign policy and USAID as the government's lead development agency.



Our Impact

- From 1990 to 2010, child mortality fell by half
- The number of children in primary school grew to 90 percent
- 2 billion people gained access to clean water
- Since 1999, the total number of those living in extreme poverty has declined by an average of nearly 50 million people every year

USAID is creating a sustainable development model that emphasizes local ownership, science, technology and innovation, partnerships and measuring results.





Why It Matters


The USAID brand reads "From the American People". However, it would be just as appropriate to write "For the American People"; everything we do in rooted in U.S. interests.

Higher Education Partnerships for Innovation and Impact (HEPII)

- How does USAID use HEPII?
 - Missions and bureaus can create addendums to the APS
 - Time-sensitive supplemental calls for concept papers
 - Create opportunity to develop partnerships and collaborative models
 - Increase access to higher education technical resources
 - Advance USAID's strategic priorities and objectives to achieve sustainable development outcomes, results, and impact
- How can Institutions of Higher Education (HEI) use HEPII?
 - HEIs can submit concept papers to USAID that address USAID's strategic priorities and objectives to achieve sustainable development outcomes, results and impact
 - Opportunity to bring new ideas and resources to the agency²⁴




Development of HEPII Concept Papers

- Review and clarification of USAID objectives and strategic priorities
 - Country Development Cooperation Strategies
 - USAID publically-released materials for potential alignment (e.g. material on website, published strategies and initiatives)
 - The specific program or activity outlined in an addendum developed by a mission or bureau
- Submission of Concept Papers
 - Mission/Bureau review and discussion
 - Final decision: no further consideration or request for application.

Considerations in developing partnerships

- USAID focus is on local systems and sustainable development outcomes
- USAID authority does not include domestic capacity building
- Coordinating timelines
- Awards are often large, multi-disciplinary and technical
- Building partnerships to leverage competitive advantages.
- Research investments are focused on implementation science





- Globalized perspective of higher education
- Increased role of private sector funding from multiple sources for development
- The commitment of donor agencies to increase funding through country systems and local organizations, including local universities
- Changing demographics
 - Youth
- Increased accountability for the sustainability of our development investment
 - Structure of higher education system in developing countries



Multiple ways for higher education to partner with USAID

- Alignment of program interests
- Participation in Broad Agency Agreements (BAA)
- Careers, Fellows, and Interns
- Funding that is directed to higher education (e.g. Scholarships and Fellowships)
- Funding that is integral to program Strategies (e.g. Global Health, Feed the Future, Global Development Lab, HESN, PEER)
- Flexible funding mechanisms
 - Global Development Alliances
 - Higher Education Partnerships for Innovation and Impact Annual Program Statement
