TEACHING

Courses

SH 721: Motor Speech Disorders

This course provides students with a foundation for examining, evaluating and determining intervention directions for individuals with motor speech disorders (MSD). Students learn the etiologies and behavioral characteristics of various MSDs and methods to differentially diagnose disorders using both instrumental and perceptual techniques assessment techniques. Students also learn to critically evaluate the potential benefits of various interventions and develop comprehensive treatment programs incorporating both evidence based-practice and client priorities.

Fall semesters (2014-present).

SH 736: Aphasia

This course helps students develop critical thinking and problem-solving skills related to language and intervention in aphasia. Students learn the etiologies and behavioral characteristics of aphasia and to related them to current models of language processing. Different intervention frameworks that span the continuum of naturalness are also discussed. Students learn to critically evaluate the potential benefits of various interventions for *individuals* with aphasia taking into consideration both linguistic and pyschosocial aspects of the client's profile.

Spring semesters (2008, 2012, 2013 and 2015 - Present).

SH 547/647: Introduction to Clinical Process

This course provides students with an overview for the methods and procedures used to treat individuals with communication and swallowing disorders. It is designed to prepare students to enter clinical practicum. Students learn about the scope of practice of the speech-language pathologist, models of service delivery as well as the ethical standards that govern the practice. General principles of clinical process including data collection, documentation and the incorporation of evidence-based treatments are discussed. The course culminates with students designing, executing and documenting a mini-treatment session with a client. Fall and Spring semesters (2003-2017)

SH 548: Introduction to Language Disorders across the Lifespan (Co-taught with Dr. Howland) This course provides students with a foundation for examining, evaluating and determining intervention directions for individuals with language disorders. Students learn about the causes and characteristics of a variety of developmental and acquired language disorders. The ICF model of disablement is used as a framework for understanding individual profiles and for designing a plan of intervention. Links between neuropathology and clinical presentation are discussed within and across neuropathologies.
Fall semesters (2009-2017)

SH 740, 741, 742, 744: Clinical Practica (adult neurogenic population)

This course sequence is designed to allow students to develop a broad range of evaluation and treatment skills. Direct supervision and lab mentorship are provided in individual treatment, group diagnostic and group treatment environments through the Academic Speech Language and Hearing Center and the Aphasia Resource Center.

Clinical Program Development

2006-present Aphasia Resource Center

- Founded in 2006, in collaboration with Dr. Gloria Waters and Jerome Kaplan, with seed funding from a Sargent alumna and a grant from the Boston Foundation.
- Developed in response to the growing community needs of individuals with aphasia to have access to long-term interventions and support.
- The mission crosses three primary platforms:
 - *Education*: provide students with hands on training in the best evidence-based practice.
 - Research: provide a clinical lab to investigate the efficacy of various therapies
 - Service: provide aphasia therapies as well as a supportive environment in which persons with aphasia can share experiences and learn about recreational and educational resources.
- Currently provides an average of 2500 treatment visits while providing varied yearly experiences for as many as 45 SLHS students, 6 MSOT students and 2 DPT students each year.
- Creates an opportunity for students to work collaboratively in an interdisciplinary environment towards a central goal of service. Consistently, students report that the ARC was one of the best experiences in their program.
- Semester program includes approximately 10-12 socially-oriented group interventions such as, conversation groups, book groups, writing groups and a co-led chorus group. Comprehensive diagnostic sessions and individual or dyadic sessions are also provided during each semester.

2011-2015 Aphasia Resource Center: Interdisciplinary, Intensive Treatment Program

- o Pilot developed in the summer of 2011.
- Expanded to a multi-year, privately funded, research program to investigate the benefits of intensive, interdisciplinary treatment for individuals with chronic, stroke-induced aphasia.
- First of its kind in the US to deliver intensive treatment that includes interventions in speech-language, occupational therapy, physical therapy and nutrition.
- Affords graduate students from all the professional programs in Sargent College an opportunity to work in an innovative, collaborative practice environment.
- Outcomes presented since its inception at three peer-reviewed conferences (CAC, ASHA, ACRM).
