SARP'S INBOX: RECENT RESEARCH HEADLINES

As the Research and Data Analysis intern, my reading list includes recently published articles on attitudes towards and improving our methods of sexual violence (SV) education, advocacy, and outreach. This month, my favorite article discusses how centers like SARP can identify popular opinion leaders (POLs) in our communities to help in advancing our mission. Research shows that education and outreach programs are more effective when there are leaders with which the community identifies (i.e. youth leaders reaching out to people in their age group, students facilitating SV trainings with adults, friends sharing stories and posts on social media, etc.). USING SOCIAL NETWORK ANALYSIS TO IDENTIFY POPULAR OPINION LEADERS

Why we care:


- Identifying popular opinion leaders (POLs) and teaching them how to be prosocial bystanders makes our community safer
- Communities attitudes are shaped by POLs, so we need them engaged in our message
- 3. You can use your sphere of influence to effect community-wide culture change!

It is possible that if influential youth leaders adopt and promote nonviolent and prosocial attitudes and behaviors, they could diffuse those attitudes and behaviors to other peers. Thus, over time, larger groups of youth would display nonviolent attitudes and behaviors, which could lead to long-term reductions in SV.

TERMS OF THE MONTH



Cisgenderism: pathologizes or rejects people's genders when they do not align with the gender they were presumed at birth.

Patriarchy: a social system in which men hold primary power and predominate in roles of political leadership, moral authority, social privilege and control of property.

Rape Culture: A set of deeply entrenched societal attitudes and beliefs that normalize sexual violence.

Heteronormativity: the concept that heterosexuality is the preferred or normal mode of sexual orientation. It assumes the gender binary and that sexual and marital relations are most fitting between people of opposite sex.

Toxic Masculinity: a set of attitudes and ways of behaving stereotypically associated with or expected of men, regarded as having a negative impact on men and on society as a whole.

THEME OF THE YEAR: MASCULINITY

Although trauma does not discriminate, our society has framed certain experiences – like sexual and domestic violence – as gendered issues. At SARP, we do not believe in this form of discrimination, and as a symbol of that, we have chosen to focus on masculinity and the ways its construction has done harm to our society. Our hope is that by educating ourselves and others, we can all work to reframe our understanding of masculinity.

JUSTIN BALDONI



Justin Baldoni is an actor, producer, director, public speaker, author, and entrepreneur. He is well known for his role in the TV show, *Jane the Virgin*, and his director role in the movie, *Five Feet Apart*. While Justin still plays a role in media, he began to focus on masculinity and the harm it has done to both him and our society as a whole in recent years.

Masculinity Focus

Justin Baldoni began speaking about masculinity in a TEDTalk he gave titled "Why I'm Done Trying to be 'Man Enough'." Following this, he started speaking at college campuses across the country. In 2021, he released his book "Man Enough: Undefining My Masculinity" and started his podcast titled "The Man Enough Podcast."

"The Man Enough Podcast" was launched early in 2021 to look at how traditional structures and attitudes toward masculinity oppress and negatively affect men, women, and humanity as a whole.

Each episode engages in honest and at times uncomfortable conversations with celebrities, thought leaders, and change-makers.
