OUR MISSION



What is Sexual Assault Awareness Month (SAAM)?

History of SAAM

Historical records show us that while open discussions about sexual and domestic violence was limited at the time, the work to raise awareness began in the 1940s/50s. In 1971, the first rape criss center was founded in San Francisco. The passing of the Violence Against Women Act in 1993 was a major change that highlighted the need for sexual violence prevention. The advocacy continued, awareness grew, and in 2001, SAAM was officially recognized. Each April, organizations across the world recognize and honor April as Sexual Assault Awareness Month through many different events.

2023 SAAM

This year is the 22nd anniversary of Sexual Assault Awareness Month! According to the National Sexual Violence Resource Center (NSVRC), the theme for this year's SAAM is "Drawing Connections: Prevention Demands Equity." NSVRC states that this theme "calls on all individuals, communities, organizations, and institutions to change ourselves and the systems surrounding us to build racial equity and respect." In order to end assault, harassment, and abuse, NSVRC believes we must end all forms of oppression.

Why is teal the color for SAAM?

Teal was chosen as the official color of Sexual Assault Awareness Month because teal is associated with trust, devotion, and healing.

As a way to raise awareness, people wear the color teal or display it to show their support for survivors of sexual violence.
