1990: <u>ICLEI</u> - Global network of more than 1,500 cities, towns and regions committed to building a sustainable future

2005: <u>C40</u> – C40 Cities Climate Leadership Group. Network of the world's megacities (et al – 90 total) committed to addressing climate change

2013: <u>**100 Resilient Cities**</u>—Created by Rockefeller Foundation to support 100 cities committed to becoming more resilient to physical, social, and economic challenges

2014: <u>GPC</u> - Final version of the Global Protocol for Community-Scale Greenhouse Gas Emission Inventories (GPC) published by WRI, C40 and ICLEI

2014: <u>Carbon Neutral Cities Alliance</u> – Collaboration of 20 leading global cities focused on deep decarbonization; Working to cut greenhouse gas emissions by 80% or more by 2050

2014: <u>Climate Mayors</u> – 470+ U.S. mayor to mayor network committed to reducing GHG emissions and supporting binding federal and global-level policymaking

2014: <u>Compact of Mayors (merged with Global Covenant of Mayors in 2016)</u> - Global coalition of 9,000 mayors and city officials committed to reduce local GHG emissions, enhancing resilience to climate change and tracking progress publicly.

2016: Sierra Club Mayors for 100% Clean Energy Initiative: 170+ cities and towns publicly pledge to work toward 100% renewable energy, supported by Sierra Club


2017: <u>We're Still In</u>, <u>America's Pledge on Climate</u> created in response to Trump administration decision to withdraw from Paris Agreement; 240+ city signatories

2018: Bloomberg launches <u>American Cities Climate Challenge</u>, pledging \$70 million competition for 100 largest US cities to tackle climate change.

BU Menino Survey of Mayors:

84% of US mayors believe that climate change is due to human activities.


Higher than the general public (68%)

70% of mayors support financial investment and fiscal sacrifice to address climate change in their community.




